The cholesterol restriction involves moderating foods like egg yolks, organ meats, and full-fat dairy, though many experts now agree that for most individuals, moderate egg consumption (up to one per day) is not harmful. The true emphasis is on reducing saturated fats found in fatty red meats, butter, and tropical oils, as these can raise LDL (bad) cholesterol.

Key Principles of the Diet

- **Focus on non-starchy vegetables:** Leafy greens, cruciferous veggies, peppers, zucchini, and asparagus provide fiber, vitamins, and low calories.

AND LOW CHOLESTEROL DIET If you eat mostly fatty meats, you can achieve a calorie deficit without constant hunger. Many people find it easier to stick to such a plan compared to low-fat diets.

Reduced Inflammation

Refined carbs and processed foods are known to promote inflammation. Replacing them with anti-inflammatory foods like vegetables, omega-3 rich fish, and nuts can lower markers such as C-reactive protein.

FOODS TO EAT ON A LOW CARB

To make this diet work, you need a clear list of allowed foods. The emphasis should be on whole, nutrient-dense options that provide a balance of protein, fiber, and healthy fats without overloading on carbs or cholesterol.

Protein Sources

- Skinless chicken or turkey breast
- Fish (salmon, mackerel, sardines, trout) – rich in omega-3s, which are heart-healthy
- Shellfish (shrimp, crab, lobster) – low in fat but moderate in cholesterol; enjoy in moderation
- Egg whites or whole eggs (limited to 1-2 yolks per day if concerned)

Healthy Fats

- Olive oil, avocado oil, flaxseed oil, walnut oil
- Nuts and seeds (almonds, walnuts, chia seeds, flaxseeds, hemp seeds)
- Nut butters (unsweetened)

Whole Grains and Starches (in very limited amounts)

- Quinoa, barley, whole oats – small portions if desired
- Sweet potatoes – moderate carb content but rich in nutrients

FOODS TO AVOID OR LIMIT

To stay true to a low carb and low cholesterol diet, steer clear of the following items.

1. **Refined Grains:** White bread, pasta, bagels, crackers, white rice, and most breakfast cereals.
2. **Sugary Foods and Beverages:** Soda, fruit juice, candy, cakes, cookies, ice cream, and sweetened yogurts.
3. **High-Fat Meats:** Fatty cuts of beef (ribeye, T-bone), pork (bacon, sausage, spare ribs), lamb, and processed meats (ham, salami, pepperoni).
4. **Full-Fat Dairy:** Whole milk, cream, butter, high-fat cheese, and cream-based sauces.
5. **Tropical Oils:** Coconut oil and palm oil are high in saturated fat; use sparingly.
6. **Fried Foods and Trans Fats:** French fries, fried chicken, donuts,

and anything with hydrogenated oils.

7. High-Cholesterol Organ Meats:

Liver, kidney, brain – these are very high in dietary cholesterol and should be avoided or consumed rarely.

SAMPLE ONE-DAY MEAL PLAN

Here's what a typical day might look like on a low carb and low cholesterol diet. This plan provides about 1,500 calories, 30 grams of net carbs, and less than 200 mg of dietary cholesterol.

Breakfast

Veggie egg white scramble: 3 egg whites, spinach, mushrooms, and bell peppers cooked in 1 teaspoon olive oil.

Serve with a small side of avocado ($\frac{1}{4}$ fruit) and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of fresh berries.

Lunch

Grilled chicken salad: 4 ounces of grilled skinless chicken breast over a bed of mixed greens, cucumber, cherry tomatoes, and shredded carrots. Dressing: 2 tablespoons of lemon juice mixed with 1 tablespoon of olive oil and herbs.

Snack

A small handful of raw almonds (about 12) and a cup of celery sticks.

Dinner

Baked salmon (4 ounces) seasoned with dill and lemon, served with roasted asparagus and a side of steamed broccoli drizzled with a little extra-virgin olive oil.

Optional Dessert

Sugar-free gelatin or a few squares of dark chocolate (85% cocoa or higher, limited to 10 grams of carbs).
