Conversely, taking a gap that is too small shows poor risk assessment. The key is to find a safe, reasonable gap and commit to your decision smoothly. Practice this skill relentlessly, as it is a core component of the test.

COMMON MISTAKES THAT LEAD TO FAILURE
