TYPES OF LEATHER GUN HOLSTER PATTERNS

Leather holsters come in many styles, each serving different carrying methods and user preferences. Understanding the various pattern types helps you choose the right project for your needs.

IWB holsters are designed to be worn inside the waistband of pants, offering excellent concealment. Patterns for IWB holsters are typically slim and often include a sweat guard to protect the leather from body moisture. They usually feature a belt clip or loops. Common IWB pattern styles include the classic pancake design and the minimalist tuckable holster.

Outside the Waistband (OWB) Patterns

Shoulder Holster Patterns

OWB holsters attach to the outside of the belt. They are generally more comfortable for extended wear and allow for a faster draw. Patterns for OWB holsters vary widely, from the simple and elegant paddle holster to the more complex and secure belt slide. The pancake holster is a popular OWB pattern known for its stability and close fit to the body.

Shoulder rigs distribute the weight of the firearm across the shoulders. Pocket Holster

They typically resemble a pouch that covers the trigger guard and part of the slide or cylinder, with a wing or extension that helps the holster stay in the pocket when the gun is drawn.

Cross Draw Patterns

Cross draw holsters are worn on the opposite side of the draw hand, allowing the user to draw across the body. These patterns are popular for hunting and

driving. They often feature a forward cant to improve ergonomics and comfort while seated.

OWB Paddle Holster Patterns

Paddle holsters feature a flat paddle that slides inside the waistband, making them easy to put on and take off without removing the belt. The pattern must account for the paddle shape and its integration with the holster body.

KEY ELEMENTS OF A GOOD HOLSTER PATTERN

Whether you are drafting your own

pattern or using a template from a trusted source, certain elements are critical for producing a functional holster.

Trigger Guard Coverage

Patterns must provide full coverage of the trigger guard to prevent accidental discharge. The leather should wrap securely around the trigger guard without interfering with the trigger itself. This area requires precise shaping and molding.

Sight

Channel Clearance

Many semi-automatic pistols have tall front and rear sights. The pattern must include a sight channel that allows the sights to pass through without snagging during the draw. This is typically achieved by cutting a groove along the top of the holster.

Retention Mechanism

Retention refers to how securely the holster holds the firearm. Patterns can include features for passive retention, such as molding the leather to

the gun's contours, or active retention, such as a thumb break strap or a tension screw. The pattern must accommodate the chosen retention method.

Belt Attachment

Patterns must include provisions for attaching the holster to the belt. This could be belt loops, a paddle, or clips. The spacing and width of the attachment must match common belt widths, typically 1.5 inches or 1.75 inches.

Cant

Angle

The cant refers to the forward or backward tilt of the holster. Many patterns specify a standard cant angle, such as 10 or 15 degrees forward, which is popular for concealment and driving. The pattern should clearly indicate the intended cant.

MATERIALS AND LEATHER SELECTION FOR PATTERNS

The type of leather you choose has a direct impact on the holster's performance and longevity. Different patterns may call for different leather characteristics.

Vegetable Tanned Leather

This is the gold standard for holster making. Vegetable tanned leather is firm, durable, and can be molded when wet to form a precise fit around the firearm. It holds its shape exceptionally well over time. This leather works beautifully with intricate wet-molded patterns.

Chrome Tanned Leather

Chrome tanned leather is softer and more pliable than vegetable

tanned leather. It is easier to work with for simple patterns but does not hold a molded shape as well. It is less suitable for holsters that require precise retention molding.

Leather Thickness

Typical holster leather ranges from 6 to 9 ounces in weight, corresponding to about 2.5 mm to 3.5 mm in thickness. Thinner leather is lighter and more flexible, while thicker leather offers greater durability and retention. The pattern should specify the recommended leather weight.

STEPS TO CREATE A LEATHER GUN

HOLSTER PATTERN

Gun Profile

If you are designing your own pattern from scratch, follow these steps to ensure accuracy and functionality.

Step 1: Make a Blue Gun

A blue gun is an inert, exact replica of the firearm. Using a blue gun allows you to trace and test fit without risk. It is an invaluable tool for pattern development.

Step 2: Trace the

Place the blue gun on a piece of stiff paper or cardboard. Trace the outline, paying careful attention to the trigger guard, slide profile, and grip. Add extra material for seams and molding. A typical allowance is 1/4 inch to 3/8 inch around the gun outline.

Step 3: Add the Sight Channel

Mark the location of the front and rear sights. Cut a groove in the pattern that allows the sights to clear the

top of the holster. The depth and width of the groove must match the sight dimensions.

Step 4: Design the Belt Attachme nt

Determine where the belt loops or clips will be attached. Mark their positions on the pattern. Ensure they are aligned correctly for the desired carry angle and belt width.

Step 5: Create a

Mockup

Cut your pattern from cheap material like craft foam or cardboard. Test the fit with the blue gun. Make adjustments to the shape, retention, and clearance as needed.

Step 6: Transfer to Leather

Once the pattern is perfected, transfer it to your leather. Trace the pattern carefully and cut with a sharp knife. This is the foundation for building the actual holster.

PATTERNS FOR DIFFERENT

CARRIES

Many leatherworkers like to modify existing patterns to suit their personal carry preferences. Here are some common adjustments.

Height of the Holster

The height determines how much of the firearm is above the belt line. A higher ride offers better concealment, while a lower ride allows for a more comfortable draw. Adjust the pattern by moving the belt attachment points up or down.

ADJUSTING

Angle of the Cant

Modifying the cant is often as simple as rotating the belt attachment relative to the holster body. Some patterns include a separate piece for the belt loops that can be angled independently.

Adding a Thumb Break

A thumb break strap adds an extra layer of security. The pattern must include a slot or anchor point for the strap, as well as a corresponding snap on the holster body.

Sweat Guard Height

Some users prefer a tall sweat guard to protect the leather from body moisture and prevent the firearm from contacting the skin. The pattern can be extended upward on the side that faces the body.

COMMON MISTAKES WHEN USING HOLSTER PATTERNS

- **Incorrect Leather Thickness:**
Using leather

that is too thick can make the holster bulky and difficult to mold. Leather that is too thin may not provide adequate retention or durability.

- **Skipping the Mockup:** Testing the pattern with a mockup material is a crucial step that many beginners skip, leading to wasted leather.
