- **Exponential and Logarithmic Functions:** Properties of exponents and logarithms, solving exponential and logarithmic equations, and graphing.
- **Trigonometry:** Unit circle, right triangle trigonometry, trigonometric identities, solving trigonometric equations, and graphing sine, cosine, and tangent functions.
- **Conic Sections and Systems of Equations:** Circles, ellipses, parabolas, hyperbolas, and solving systems of linear and nonlinear equations.
- **Sequences and Series:** Arithmetic and geometric sequences and series, sigma notation.
- **Introductory Calculus Concepts:** Limits, continuity, and the concept of a derivative (for students aiming at Calculus I placement).

### Algebraic Foundations

The exam will ask you to work with linear, quadratic, polynomial, rational, exponential, logarithmic, and trigonometric functions. Be prepared to:

- Find the domain of a function expressed algebraically or graphically.
- Determine the range of a function.
- Identify and sketch transformations of functions (shifts, stretches, compressions, reflections).
- Find the inverse of a function and understand the relationship between a function and its inverse.
- Compose functions and find the resulting domain.
- Solve applied problems using functions, such as distance, rate, time, and optimization.

## Exponential and Logarithmic Functions

Exponential and logarithmic functions often trip up students because they involve a different kind of thinking. However, they are heavily represented on the placement exam, particularly for students aiming at Calculus I or Business Calculus.

- Apply the laws of exponents and logarithms to simplify expressions.
- Convert between exponential and logarithmic forms.
- Solve exponential and logarithmic equations using properties of logarithms.
- Graph exponential and logarithmic functions, identifying key features like asymptotes and intercepts.
- Apply exponential models to growth and decay problems.

## Trigonometry

Trigonometry is a make-or-break section for many students. The **Texas Tech Math Placement Exam** includes both right triangle trigonometry and the unit circle approach. Master the following:

- Understand radian and degree measure and convert between them.
- Know the unit circle: sine, cosine, and tangent for key angles (0, 30, 45, 60, 90 degrees and their radian equivalents).
- Graph sine, cosine, and tangent functions, identifying amplitude, period, phase shift, and vertical shift.
- Use fundamental trigonometric identities (Pythagorean, reciprocal, quotient) to simplify expressions.
- Solve basic trigonometric equations for solutions in a given interval.
- Apply the Law of Sines and Law of Cosines to solve triangles.

## Sequences, Series, and Conics

These topics often appear in the later part of the exam. While they may not be as heavily weighted as algebra or trigonometry, they can still influence your overall score. Be able to:

- Find the  $n$ th term of arithmetic and geometric sequences.
- Find the sum of finite arithmetic and geometric series.
- Use sigma notation to represent and evaluate sums.
- Identify and sketch conic sections: circles, ellipses, parabolas, and hyperbolas from their equations.

## Introductory Calculus Concepts (For High Scorers)

If you are aiming for placement into Calculus I, you will need to demonstrate an understanding of limits and the derivative. This does not mean you need to have taken a full calculus course, but you should be comfortable with:

- Evaluating limits graphically, numerically, and algebraically.
- Understanding continuity and identifying points of discontinuity.
- Understanding the concept of the derivative as the slope of a tangent line.
- Basic derivative rules (power rule, constant rule, sum/difference rule).

Do not spend too much time on calculus if you are still struggling with algebra and trigonometry. The exam is designed to place you into the correct course, so it is better to score well in the foundational topics than to chase calculus questions at the expense of everything else.
