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HOW TO WRITE AN AUSTRALIAN RESUME: A COMPLETE GUIDE FOR JOB SEEKERS

If you are looking for work in Australia, you need to understand that the local job market has its own expectations about how a resume should look and what it should contain. value clarity, brevity, and a focus on achievements over responsibilities.

punchy. The key is to make every word count because recruiters spend an average of only six to seven seconds scanning a resume.

Format

Before you type a single word, you need to understand the structure that Australian employers expect. The standard Australian resume is usually two to three pages long, never longer than four pages. It is written in reverse chronological order, meaning your most recent job comes first. Unlike some countries where a photograph or a long personal statement is common, Australian resumes avoid photos, and they keep the personal profile short and

Essential Sections of an Australian Resume

When you ask yourself **how to write an Australian resume**, start with the core sections that every employer expects to see. Missing one of these can get your application filtered out before a human even reads it.

1. CONTACT INFORMATION

Place your name at the top in a clear, professional font. Below your name, include your phone number, a professional email address, and your suburb and state (not your full street address for privacy reasons). Add your LinkedIn profile URL if you have one, but make sure it matches the information on your resume. Do not include your date of birth, marital status, or a photograph—these are considered irrelevant and can lead to unconscious bias.

2. PROFESSIONAL SUMMARY OR PROFILE

A professional summary is a short paragraph of three to

five lines that introduces you as a candidate. It should state your job title, your years of experience, your key skills, and what you bring to the role. For example: “Results-driven project manager with eight years of experience delivering large-scale infrastructure projects across Australia. Skilled in stakeholder management, budget control, and risk mitigation. Seeking a senior role in a forward-thinking engineering firm.” Tailor this summary to each job you apply for. This is one of the most critical parts of **how to write an Australian resume** because it sets the tone for everything that follows.

3. KEY SKILLS

List your most relevant hard and soft skills in bullet points. Hard skills might include software proficiency, technical certifications, or languages. Soft skills include communication, leadership, and problem-solving. Be honest and specific. For example, instead of “good communication skills,” write “facilitated cross-team collaboration on a \$2M project.” Use keywords from the job advertisement to align your skills with what the employer is seeking. This also helps your resume pass through Applicant Tracking Systems (ATS).

4. WORK

This is the most important section. List your jobs in reverse chronological order. For each role, include the company name, location, your job title, and the dates you worked there (month and year). Under each role, use bullet points to describe your responsibilities, but more importantly, your achievements. Australian employers want to see what you accomplished, not just what you were hired to do. Use strong action verbs like “led,” “implemented,” “designed,” “increased,” or “reduced.” Whenever possible, quantify results: “Reduced customer wait times by 30% through process re-engineering.” If you

have gaps in your employment history, briefly explain them in a honest way. Avoid leaving unexplained gaps because they raise questions.

5. EDUCATION

List your highest qualification first. Include the institution name, the degree or certificate, and the year of completion. If you are a recent graduate, you can include relevant coursework or your grade point average if it is strong. For experienced professionals, education goes after work experience. In Australia, mentioning your high school is not necessary once you have a tertiary qualification. If you have completed any Australian

qualifications like a Certificate III, Diploma, or a university degree, highlight them prominently because local qualifications are highly valued.

6. ADDITIONAL SECTIONS (CERTIFICATIONS, LANGUAGES, VOLUNTEER WORK)

Depending on your industry, you may add sections for professional certifications, technical skills, languages, or volunteer experience. For example, if you are in construction, list your White Card. If you are in IT, list your cybersecurity certifications.

Volunteer work demonstrates community involvement and can fill employment gaps.

Keep these sections concise and relevant to the job.

Formatting and Design Tips

The visual appearance of your resume matters. When learning **how to write an Australian resume**, remember that Australian employers prefer clean, simple, and professional designs. Avoid using templates with too many colours, graphics, or tables because they can confuse ATS software. Use a standard font like Arial, Calibri, or Times New Roman in size 10 to 12. Use bold

and italics sparingly to emphasize section headings or job titles, but avoid underlining because it can look unprofessional. Keep margins between 2.5 cm and 3 cm to ensure enough white space. Save your resume as a PDF unless the employer specifies otherwise, but make sure your name and the job title are in the filename:

A common mistake that international job seekers make is sending the same resume to every job. In Australia, employers expect you to customise your resume for each application. Start by reading the job description carefully and identifying the key requirements. Then adjust your professional summary, key skills, and work experience bullet points to mirror the language used in the advertisement. Use the same keywords and

phrases that appear in the job posting. This not only shows you have read the posting carefully but also increases your chances of being selected by an ATS. For example, if the job requires “stakeholder engagement,” make sure that exact phrase appears in your resume if you have that experience.

Writing Achievement- Focused Bullet Points

One of the most effective ways to

impress an Australian recruiter is to use the CAR method: Challenge, Action, Result. For each bullet point in your work experience, describe a challenge you faced, the action you took, and the result you achieved. For instance: "Challenge: The company was missing monthly sales targets. Action: Implemented a new lead tracking system and trained the sales team. Result: Sales increased by 20% within three months." This structure makes your contributions clear and measurable. It moves your resume from a list of duties to a portfolio of successes. This technique is central to understanding **how to write an Australian resume** that gets interviews.

Australia n Terminolo gy and Spelling

Use Australian English spelling consistently throughout your resume. Write "organisation" instead of "organization," "colour" instead of "color," and "centre" instead of "center." Dates are written in day-month-year format, for example, "March 2023" or "3 March 2023." Months are written out fully. Also, be aware of Australian job titles and industry-specific terms. For example, "CV" is used

interchangeably with “resume” in Australia, but “resumé” is more common for standard job applications. Using local spelling and terminology shows you understand the market and pays attention to detail.

What Not to Include

Just as important as what to include is what to leave out. Australian resumes should never include a photograph, your date of birth, your marital status, your nationality, or your visa status in the main body. If you have a work visa, you can mention it briefly in a cover letter or at the end of your resume, but it is not required upfront. Avoid using personal pronouns like

“I” or “me” because resumes are written in first-person implied. Instead of “I was responsible for managing a team,” write “Managed a team of 15 staff.” Also, avoid listing references on your resume. Instead, write “References available upon request” at the bottom. Some experts even skip that line because it is assumed.

n Proofreading and Testing Your Resume

Approach

In Australia, a cover letter is still expected for most professional roles. It should be a separate document, no longer than one page, and it should complement your resume, not repeat it. When learning **how to write an Australian resume**, do not forget that a well-crafted cover letter can be the difference between being ignored and getting an interview.

Before you send your resume, proofread it multiple times. Read it aloud to catch awkward phrasing. Ask a friend or a professional to review it. Check for spelling mistakes, inconsistent formatting, and missing information. Also, test your resume by trying to upload it to an online job portal to see if the text is readable. Sometimes PDFs with special characters or unusual fonts fail to parse. You can even run your

resume through a free ATS simulator to see how it performs. Small errors can cost you the opportunity, so invest time in perfecting your document.

Common Mistakes to Avoid

Even experienced professionals make errors when they try to write an Australian resume. Avoid these common pitfalls:
