3. Controllin g Line Quality

SIMPLE APPLE

Now we will apply everything using a concrete example. We will draw a realistic apple using a **step by step to draw** method. This exercise is perfect for beginners because an apple is simple in shape yet offers excellent practice in shading and form.

Step 1: Block In the Basic Shape

Start with a light, loose circle. Do not worry if it is not perfect. Use your HB pencil with minimal pressure. The circle should be roughly the overall size of the

apple. The **DRAWING A** slight indentation at the top to indicate where the stem will go. This is the planning stage; keep your lines light so they can be erased later.

Step 2: Refine the Contour

Observe your reference apple (or a real one). Notice that it is not a perfect sphere. It may be slightly wider at the bottom or have subtle bumps. Use your eraser to correct the circle and draw a more accurate outline. Add a small curve for the top cavity and a short line for the stem. Add a small leaf shape if

desired. Use your 2B pencil for slightly darker, more deliberate lines.

Step 3: Add the Light Source and Core Shadow

Decide where your light is coming from. Let us say it is from the top left. The right side and bottom of the apple will be in shadow. Lightly sketch the boundaries of the highlight area (the bright spot where light hits directly). Then, indicate the core shadow area on the

opposite side. Also, add a cast shadow on the table or ground beneath the apple. This step is crucial because it establishes the three-dimensional illusion.

Step 4: Apply the Base Tone

Using a 2B or 4B pencil, begin shading the areas that are not in direct light. Use smooth, even strokes following the curve of the apple (curved strokes around the form). Avoid pressing too hard. This base layer should be uniform and represent the mid-tone of the apple. Leave the

highlight area completely white for now. Also, fill in the cast shadow with a darker tone, soft at the edges farthest from the apple.

Step 5: Deepen the Shadows and Add Halftones

Switch to a 4B or 6B pencil. Darken the core shadow on the apple's right side and the area near the bottom where it touches the table. The cast shadow directly under the apple should be the darkest. Now, work on

the halftones—the transition area between the light side and the shadow side. Use a blending stump or tissue to smooth out the pencil marks. This creates a gradual, realistic gradient. Do not forget to shade the stem and add a dark tone to the left side of the stem to show form.

Step 6: Add the Highlight and Details

Take your kneaded eraser (or a regular eraser cut to a point) and lift out the highlight on the top left. Make it crisp and bright. You can also

soften the edges of the highlight slightly. Add a small reflection on the bottom edge if the apple is sitting on a reflective surface. Finally, add any subtle blemishes or color variations by very lightly applying a soft pencil and blending. Add a small dark dot near the base of the stem for realism.

Step 7: Refine and Finalize

Step back and look at your drawing from a distance. Compare the value range: Do you have a full range from pure white (highlight) to almost black (core shadow)? If not,

deepen the dark areas and brighten the highlights. Clean up any smudges around the apple using your eraser. Add a few final touches to the stem—maybe a tiny shadow from the leaf. Sign your work in the bottom right corner. Congratulations! You have completed a **step by step to draw** of an apple.

APPLYING THE SAME METHOD TO MORE COMPLEX SUBJECTS
