KEY TOPICS COVERED IN THE GED MATH PRACTICE TEST 2014

The 2014 GED Math test was organized into two major content domains: quantitative problem solving and algebraic problem solving. Within these domains, specific skill areas were emphasized. Understanding these topics will help you use your practice test more effectively and identify your strengths and weaknesses.

Quantitative Problem Solving

This section accounted for about 45% of the total score. It covered basic math operations, fractions, decimals, percentages, ratios, and proportions. You were also tested on number sense, exponents, roots, and order of operations. Additionally, data analysis and statistics fell under this domain, including interpreting graphs, tables, and charts, as well as calculating mean, median, mode, and range. Geometry and measurement problems—such as area, perimeter, volume, and coordinate geometry—were also part of quantitative problem solving.

Algebraic Problem Solving

Geometry and Measurement

Geometry was integrated into both quantitative and algebraic domains. SAMPLE QUESTIONS FROM THE GED MATH PRACTICE TEST 2014

Answers to these sample questions are: 1) C, 2) -1.5, 3) 25. Practicing such problems helps you recall basic operations and build speed.

TIPS FOR SCORING HIGH ON THE GED MATH SECTION

Achieving a high score on the GED math test requires more than just knowing formulas. Here are proven strategies that work well when combined with a **GED Math Practice Test 2014**.
