UNDERSTANDING THE GREAT

FALLS TV MARKET

Great Falls sits in a unique broadcast market, designated as Designated Market Area (DMA) 191 by Nielsen. This means the city receives its own set of local affiliates, news stations, and public broadcasting channels. For anyone looking for a **TV Guide Great Falls MT** listing, it all begins with knowing which major networks are available over the air.

Local Broadcast Channels

If you use an antenna, you can access several free channels that air national network programming, local news, and syndicated shows. The primary stations serving Great Falls include:

- **KRTV (CBS)** – Channel 3.1 – The local CBS affiliate, offering network prime-time shows, NFL football, and regional news.
- **KFBB (ABC / Fox)** – Channel 5.1 (ABC) and 5.2 (Fox) – This dual-affiliate station provides both ABC and Fox programming on separate subchannels.
- **MTN (NBC)** – Channel 1.1 – NBC's local outlet, home to "The Voice," "Chicago" franchise, and local weather coverage.
- **KUSM (PBS)** – Channel 9.1 – Montana PBS delivers quality educational content, nature documentaries, and children's programming.

- **KHBB-LP (MyNetworkTV / MeTV)** – Channel 21.x – A low-power station that offers classic reruns and MyNetworkTV fare.

These over-the-air channels are the foundation of any **TV Guide Great Falls MT** schedule. They are free to receive with a simple digital antenna, which we will discuss later in this guide.

Additional Digital Subchannels

Many stations now broadcast multiple subchannels. For instance, KRTV often includes a weather channel or "Comet" on its second subchannel. KFBB may have "Antenna TV" or "Grit." Checking a current listings database can reveal these hidden gems. Keep in mind that subchannel availability can change, so it is wise to periodically rescan your TV's tuner to catch any new additions.

HOW TO ACCESS A TV GUIDE FOR GREAT FALLS MONTANA

Gone are the days of the single printed newspaper insert. Today, you have multiple ways to get accurate, up-to-date **TV Guide Great Falls MT** listings. Whether you prefer digital convenience or a traditional paper schedule, options abound.

Online TV Listings Websites

Several national and local websites provide customized schedules. Some popular options include:

- **TitanTV** – Offers a free,

interactive grid where you can filter by zip code (59401, 59404, 59405) to see exactly what is airing in Great Falls.

- **TVGuide.com** – The classic site still works. Enter your zip code and provider (antenna, cable, streaming) to see accurate listings.
- **Zap2it** – Another reliable source for TV listings across all providers.
- **Local newspaper websites** – The *Great Falls Tribune* often publishes a weekly TV section in print, and its website may offer digital listings.

These online grids typically show the next two weeks of programming, making it easy to plan your viewing around live events like sports or breaking news.

Cable and Satellite Provider Guides

If you subscribe to Optimum (the primary cable provider in Great Falls since the Charter merger) or to DIRECTV or Dish Network, your remote control gives you an on-screen guide. These electronic program guides (EPGs) are usually sorted by channel number and time. You can search by show title or browse by category. They are the most convenient **TV Guide Great Falls MT** source for subscribers, as they update in real time when networks adjust schedules.

Smart TV and

Streaming Device Apps

Smart TVs from Samsung, LG, Sony, and others come with built-in guide apps that pull data from the internet. Similarly, devices like Roku, Apple TV, and Amazon Fire Stick have free TV guide channels (e.g., "The Roku Channel" with a live TV guide). For a fee, you can also use apps like **TvEars** or **iGuide** for more detailed functionality.

CABLE AND SATELLITE PROVIDERS IN GREAT FALLS

For many households, relying solely on an antenna is not enough. They want the full channel lineup that includes sports networks, news channels like CNN and Fox News, and premium movie channels. Below are the main subscription TV providers serving Great Falls.

Optimum (Formerly Charter Spectrum)

Optimum is the dominant cable provider in the area. It offers various packages with hundreds of channels, including local networks, ESPN, TNT, and more. Optimum also offers a streaming option called Optimum Stream, which uses an app on a compatible device without needing a set-top box. For the most accurate **TV Guide Great Falls MT** listings on Optimum, use the on-screen guide or the Optimum TV app.

DIRECTV and Dish Network

Satellite services remain popular in rural areas around Great Falls where cable may not reach. Both providers offer national channel packages with local channels included. Their guides are accessible via the remote. One advantage is the ability to get regional sports networks like Root Sports (now AT&T SportsNet) for Seattle Mariners or Portland Trail Blazers games, depending on your package.

Streaming TV Services

In recent years, many Great Falls residents have cut the cord in favor of live TV streaming services. These platforms typically include local broadcast channels and many cable favorites. Popular options include:

- **YouTube TV** – Offers local channels, unlimited DVR, and a clean guide interface. Works on smart TVs, phones, and computers.
- **Hulu + Live TV** – Combines on-demand Hulu content with live channels, including locals in Great Falls.
- **DIRECTV Stream** – A streaming version of DIRECTV with a similar channel lineup.
- **FuboTV** – Focused on sports but includes entertainment and local channels. Check if it carries KRTV and KFBB in your area.

Each of these services provides its own

TV Guide Great Falls MT interface, usually with a grid that shows what is on now and upcoming. You can often sort by favorites or search for specific programs.

USING AN ANTENNA FOR FREE TV IN GREAT FALLS

If you want to save money and still get high-definition broadcasts, an over-the-air (OTA) antenna is an excellent choice. With the right antenna, you can receive all major networks free of charge. Here is what you need to know for Great Falls.

Antenna Types and Recommendations

Great Falls sits in a valley along the Missouri River, and the broadcast towers are generally located on lower elevations. Most major stations (CBS, NBC, ABC, Fox) transmit from a site near the city. A simple indoor antenna with a range of 30-40 miles may suffice for many homes, especially if you live in a suburban area without too many obstructions. However, if you are farther out—say, near the airport or west of town—a multi-directional outdoor antenna might be necessary.

Popular models include:

- **Mohu Leaf 50** – A thin indoor antenna that can be mounted on a wall or window. Works best if you are within 20 miles of the towers.
- **Antennas Direct ClearStream 2V** – A compact outdoor antenna

that picks up signals from multiple directions.

- **Winegard HD7698P** – A larger outdoor antenna suitable for rural areas over 50 miles away.

Setting Up Your Antenna

After purchasing an antenna, install it as high as possible (attic or outside). Connect a coaxial cable to your TV's "Antenna In" port. Then, go to your TV's settings and select "Auto-Tune" or "Channel Scan." The TV will search for all available signals. Once the scan completes, you will have a list of channels. This becomes your own personal **TV Guide Great Falls MT** lineup—viewable via your TV's built-in guide, which may show program names if your TV supports guide data (often limited to "Now" and "Next"). For a full schedule, refer to an online guide.

Tips for Best Reception

If you experience pixelation or missing channels, try these fixes:

- Re-scan your TV after a storm or if channels disappear.
 - Move the antenna around the room or to a different window.
 - Use a signal amplifier (only if you are splitting the signal to multiple TVs).
 - Check if any local towers are off-air due to maintenance.
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
