This prevents dirty water from siphoning back into the dishwasher. Secure the hose with a zip tie to the underside of the countertop or cabinet. Use a hose clamp at the drain connection point.

Step 4: Slide the Dishwasher into Place

Carefully push the dishwasher into the opening, feeding the supply line and drain hose as you go. Avoid kinking the hoses. Use a level to check front-to-back and side-to-side alignment. Adjust the legs (usually turning them clockwise to raise, counterclockwise to lower) until the unit is perfectly level.
