

How Did Nate Dogg Die

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THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF A WEST COAST ICON

The world of hip-hop and R&B lost a towering figure on March 15, 2011, when Nathaniel Dwayne Hale, known professionally as Nate Dogg, passed away at the age of 41. For millions of fans worldwide, the question "How did Nate Dogg die" remains more than a query about a medical condition—it is a search for understanding the tragic end of a voice that defined the soundtrack of a generation.
