Significant Continuation Patterns

These patterns suggest that the market is taking a "breather" before continuing in the same direction as the prior trend.

- **Triangles (Symmetrical, Ascending, Descending):** Murphy clearly explains how an ascending triangle is bullish and a descending triangle is bearish, while a symmetrical triangle is a neutral pattern of consolidation.
- **Flags and Pennants:** Short-term, steeply sloped patterns that typically form after a sharp move. They are characterized by declining volume and are among the most reliable continuation signals.

- **Wedges:** Similar to triangles but with a distinct slope. A falling wedge is often bullish, while a rising wedge is bearish.

TECHNICAL INDICATORS: ADDING PRECISION TO YOUR ANALYSIS

- **Volume and On-Balance Volume (OBV):** Volume is the fuel that drives the market.
