GRADE LEVEL CONSIDERATIONS FOR 10 MORE 10 LESS WORKSHEETS

Regardless of grade, the core skill remains the same: understand that adding ten increases the tens digit by one (with possible regrouping into hundreds), and subtracting ten does the opposite.				

SAMPLE ACTIVITIES FOUND IN HIGH-QUALITY WORKSHEETS

When creating or choosing **10 more 10 less worksheets**, look for variety. Here are some of the most effective activity types:

Hundreds Chart Puzzle

A partially filled hundreds chart shows only a few numbers. Students must write the numbers that are 10 more and 10 less than the ones shown. This activity forces them to use spatial reasoning along with arithmetic.

Roll and Write

A worksheet includes a dice roll section. The student rolls a die, writes the number (or uses a provided starting number), then writes the two answers. This adds an element of chance and play.

Missing Vertical Column

TIPS FOR CREATING YOUR OWN 10 MORE 10 LESS WORKSHEETS

- **Relying on counting by ones:** Students who have not yet grasped place value will try to use their fingers. Worksheets that emphasize the tens-digit
