The result is a niche that thrives almost entirely on the used car market, where enthusiasts seek out examples from the golden era of manual crossovers.

NOTABLE CROSSOVER VEHICLES THAT OFFERED A MANUAL TRANSMISSION

Subaru Crosstrek (2013–2023)

The Subaru Crosstrek is arguably the most famous modern manual crossover. Subaru offered a six-speed manual on the base and Premium trims of the Crosstrek for nearly a decade. It combined Subaru’s legendary all-wheel drive, decent ground clearance (8.7 inches), and a practical hatchback shape with a satisfying shifter. The manual Crosstrek became a darling of outdoor enthusiasts and driving purists. Unfortunately, with the 2024 redesign, Subaru dropped the manual entirely, citing extremely low take rates (less than 2% of sales). However, used examples from 2018–2023 are plentiful and remain a top recommendation.

Mazda CX-30 (2020–2024)

Mazda has long been a champion of driver engagement, and the CX-30—a subcompact crossover—was available with a six-speed manual in select markets. In the United States, the manual was offered only on the base 2.5 S trim with front-wheel drive. It wasn’t a volume seller, but it provided a wonderfully responsive shift feel and enthusiastic handling. As of the 2024 model year, Mazda has phased out the manual CX-30 in North America, though it might still be available in other regions. For those seeking a modern, refined crossover with a stickshift, the used CX-30 is a gem.

Mini Countryman (2010–2023)

Mini has a heritage of manual transmissions, and the Countryman crossover continued that tradition. The base Cooper Countryman came with a six-speed manual, and even the performance-oriented John Cooper Works (JCW) variant offered a stick shift. The Countryman’s quirky style, go-kart handling, and optional all-wheel drive made it a unique choice among manual crossovers. Production ended for the manual in many markets by 2023, but earlier models can be found.

Jeep Renegade (2015–2022)

Jeep introduced the Renegade as a compact, off-road-capable crossover. Early models offered a six-speed manual transmission paired with Jeep’s Trail Rated capability. The manual Renegade was especially popular with budget-conscious adventurers who wanted the flexibility of a stick shift for rocky terrain. However, reliability concerns and low sales led Jeep to discontinue the manual option after 2022.

Other Notable Mentions

- **Ford Escape** (pre-2012): Older Ford Escape models (especially with the 2.3L engine) offered a five-speed manual. These are now high-mileage veterans but can be found cheap.
- **Kia Soul** (2010–2023): While often classified as a hatchback, the Soul’s upright design and elevated driving position qualify it as a crossover. Manual versions were available in lower trims until 2023.
- **Suzuki Grand Vitara** (2005–2013): A true body-on-frame SUV that drove like a crossover, it offered a manual with low-range gearing—a rare combination.
- **Hyundai Tucson** (pre-2016): Some older Tucson models came with a manual, but they are increasingly rare.
