## SELECTING AND PREPARING YOUR LAMB SHOULDER

## Choosing the Perfect Cut

When shopping for a lamb shoulder for slow cooking, look for a piece that has good marbling—thin streaks of fat running through the meat. The fat should be creamy white, and the meat a deep rosy-red. A bone-in shoulder adds extra flavour as the bone conducts heat and releases marrow, but a boneless, rolled shoulder works wonderfully too. Typically, a bone-in shoulder weighing about 2-2.5 kg (4.5-5.5 lbs) will serve 4-6 people generously.

## Trimming and Scoring

While fat is your friend in slow cooking, you may want to trim any excessively thick, hard fat cap on the surface, leaving a thin layer (about ½ cm) to baste the meat. Scoring the fat in a diamond pattern (cutting shallow lines through the fat but not into the meat) allows seasonings to penetrate and helps the fat render evenly. Pat the lamb dry with paper towels to ensure a good sear if you choose to brown it—a step highly recommended for depth of flavour.

## BUILDING BOLD FLAVOURS: SEASONING AND MARINADES

The beauty of a **Slow Cooked Lamb Shoulder Recipe** is that it welcomes robust, aromatic flavours that permeate the meat over the long cooking time. A classic Mediterranean combination of garlic, rosemary, and thyme pairs perfectly with lamb. ## Dry Rub vs. Wet Marinade

A wet marinade—oil-based with fresh herbs, crushed garlic, lemon juice, and mustard—adds moisture and deeper penetration. For best results, apply the marinade or rub at least 4 hours before cooking, or ideally overnight in the refrigerator. Remove the lamb from the fridge 30-60 minutes before cooking to take the chill off.

## Recommended Flavour Profile for This Recipe

- Herbs:** Fresh rosemary (chopped), fresh thyme leaves, dried oregano.
- Aromatics:** 6-8 cloves of garlic (sliced or crushed), 1 large onion (quartered).
- Acidity:** Juice and zest of 1 lemon, or 2 tablespoons of red wine vinegar.
- Liquid Base:** 250 ml (1 cup) chicken or lamb stock, plus 150 ml (⅔ cup) dry white wine.
- Optional Umami Boosters:** 1 tablespoon tomato paste, 2 anchovy fillets (mashed), or 1 teaspoon soy sauce.

## TWO FOOLPROOF METHODS: OVEN VS. SLOW COOKER

You can achieve outstanding results using either a conventional oven or a slow cooker. The oven yields a beautifully caramelised exterior, while the slow cooker offers unparalleled convenience and even heat. Below are clear instructions for both.

## Oven Method (Recommended for Crispy Edges)

Preheat your oven to 160°C (320°F). Sear the seasoned lamb shoulder in a large, heavy-based Dutch oven or roasting pan with a little oil over medium-high heat until deeply browned on all sides (about 4-5 minutes per side). Remove the lamb and sauté the onion and garlic until softened.

Deglaze the pan with wine, scraping up the browned bits. Add the stock, tomato paste, and herbs. Return the lamb to the pan, cover tightly with a lid or foil, and transfer to the oven. Cook for 3-4 hours for a 2 kg shoulder, or until the meat is fork-tender and starting to pull away from the bone. For a caramelised top, uncover for the last 30 minutes and increase the oven temperature to 200°C (400°F).

## Slow Cooker Method (Hands-Off Simplicity)

For the ultimate set-and-forget experience, use a slow cooker. Sear the lamb as above (do not skip this step for flavour). Place the seared lamb in the slow cooker. In a small bowl, mix the stock, wine, tomato paste, garlic, herbs, and lemon juice. Pour around the lamb. Add the quartered onion. Cook on low for 8-10 hours or on high for 5-6 hours. The meat should be falling apart when tested. For a richer sauce, transfer the cooking liquid to a saucepan after cooking, skim excess fat, and reduce over high heat. You can also place the cooked lamb under a hot grill (broiler) for 5 minutes to crisp the fat if desired.

## STEP-BY-STEP SLOW COOKED LAMB SHOULDER RECIPE

Here is a complete, detailed recipe that combines the best of both methods. This yields a deeply flavoured, fall-apart lamb shoulder that will become your go-to.

## Ingredients

- 2-2.5 kg bone-in lamb shoulder (or boneless rolled)
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large onion, roughly chopped
- 6 garlic cloves, thinly sliced
- 2 tablespoons fresh rosemary leaves, chopped
- 1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves
- Zest and juice of 1 lemon
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- 250 ml chicken or lamb stock
- 150 ml dry white wine (or additional stock)
- 2 teaspoons sea salt
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- Optional: 2 anchovy fillets (optional, for umami)

## Instructions

- Prepare the Lamb:** Pat the lamb shoulder dry. Score the fat in a diamond pattern. Mix salt, pepper, rosemary, and thyme together, then rub all over the lamb. If using anchovies, mash into a paste and smear onto the meat. Cover and refrigerate overnight (or at least 4 hours). Bring to room temperature 30 minutes before cooking.
- Sear the Lamb:** Preheat oven to 160°C (320°F) or set your slow cooker to warm if using that method. Heat olive oil in a large Dutch oven or frying pan over medium-high heat. Sear the lamb shoulder for 3-4 minutes per side until deeply golden. Transfer lamb to a plate.
- Build the Base:** In the same pot, add onion and garlic and cook for 2 minutes until fragrant. Stir in tomato paste and cook for 1 minute. Pour in the wine, scraping any browned bits from the bottom. Let it bubble for 1 minute, then add stock and lemon juice and zest. Bring to a gentle simmer.
- Slow Cook:** Return the lamb to the pot (or transfer everything to a slow cooker). For oven: cover with a lid or foil and cook for 3½-4 hours, turning once halfway, until the meat yields easily when prodded. For slow cooker: cover and cook on low for 8-10 hours or high for 5-6 hours.
- Rest and Serve:** Carefully transfer the lamb to a serving platter. Let it rest, loosely tented with foil, for 15-20 minutes. Meanwhile, strain the cooking liquid into a saucepan, skim off excess fat, and simmer to thicken into a glossy sauce. Serve the lamb in large chunks or shred it with two forks. Spoon the sauce over the top.

## TIPS FOR ACHIEVING FALL-APART TENDERNESS EVERY TIME

- Low and slow is non-negotiable:** Resist the urge to increase the temperature. Collagen breaks down between 71-82°C (160-180°F). Rushing will result in tough meat.
- Keep it moist:** Ensure there is always at least 1-2 cm of liquid in the bottom of the pan. If the liquid evaporates too much, add a splash more stock or water.
- Let the meat rest:** Resting allows the juices to redistribute. Cutting into it immediately will cause the moisture to run out.
- Use a meat thermometer:** For precision, cook until the internal temperature reaches at least 90°C (195°F). The meat should feel like butter when pierced.
- Don't skip the sear:** The Maillard reaction from browning adds an irreplaceable depth of flavour that simmering alone cannot achieve.

## SERVING SUGGESTIONS: THE PERFECT ACCOMPANIMENTS

Your **Slow Cooked Lamb Shoulder Recipe** deserves sides that complement its richness without overwhelming it. Classic pairings include creamy mashed potatoes, which soak up the glorious jus, or roasted root vegetables such as carrots, parsnips, and sweet potatoes.
