From the most famous scene—tilting at windmills he believes are giants—to freeing a group of convicts he mistakes for oppressed gentlemen, Quixote's actions are a constant collision between his ideal world and the harsh, practical reality of 17th-century Spain. The first part ends with a ruse: his friends and family bring him home in a cage, blaming his madness on enchantment.

## The Second Part (1615)

The second part of **Don Quixote Miguel De Cervantes** wrote is a different beast. It is a metafictional masterpiece.
