For crossword solvers, Fenrir is a gift: six letters, heavy with vowels, and almost always clued directly as a monster or wolf.

2. Jormungandr: The World Serpent

Common Clues: "Midgard serpent," "Sea monster of Norse myth," "Thor's enemy," "Loki's child."

Letter Count: 10 (often abbreviated in grids as JORMUN or clued with the alternate spelling "Midgardsormr")

Mythology: Jormungandr is another child of Loki, this one a serpent so enormous that it grew to encircle the entire world of Midgard, grasping its own tail in an endless ouroboros. This serpent is the arch-nemesis of Thor, the god of thunder. Their final battle occurs at Ragnarok, where Thor kills the serpent with his hammer Mjolnir, but only after taking nine steps, succumbs to the serpent's venom and dies.
