ESSENTIAL TOOLS AND MATERIALS FOR A SAFE SELF- PIERCING

Gathering the correct supplies is the first critical step in understanding **how to pierce your own nose** safely. Using improper or unsterile equipment dramatically increases the risk of infection, scarring, and improper healing. Do not compromise on the

quality of these materials.

What You Will Need

- **A sterile, hollow piercing needle:** This is non-negotiable. Do not use a safety pin, earring gun, or sewing needle. A hollow needle is designed to create a clean hole by removing a small amount of tissue, which significantly reduces trauma and promotes faster healing. Purchase a single-use, pre-sterilized needle of the correct gauge (usually 18G or 20G for a

nostril piercing).

- **Implant-grade jewelry:** Choose a nostril screw, L-shaped stud, or labret-style stud made from surgical stainless steel, titanium, niobium, or 14k solid gold. Avoid cheap metals that contain nickel, which can cause allergic reactions. The jewelry should be sterilized before insertion.
- **Surgical marker or a sterile, non-toxic pen:** This is used to mark the exact placement of the piercing.
- **Medical-grade antiseptic solution:** Povidone-iodine (Betadine) or chlorhexidine solution is used to disinfect the skin before the procedure.
- **Sterile gloves:** These are essential to prevent transferring bacteria from your hands to the piercing site. Nitrile or latex gloves are appropriate.
- **Sterile cotton balls or gauze pads:** For cleaning and applying antiseptic.
- **A small mirror:** A magnifying mirror or a well-lit bathroom mirror will help you see precisely what you are doing.
- **A cork or a piece of gauze:**

Placing this inside your nostril provides a backstop for the needle as it passes through the tissue.

- **Rubbing alcohol (70% isopropyl alcohol):** For disinfecting the jewelry and the needle package before opening.

with rubbing alcohol. Lay out all your tools on a clean paper towel. Wash your hands with antibacterial soap for at least 20 seconds, then put on your sterile gloves. The entire process from this point forward requires a sterile environment.

STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE: HOW TO PIERCE YOUR OWN NOSE

This is the core of the procedure. Follow these steps carefully and deliberately. Do not rush. If at any point you feel faint, dizzy, or uncertain, stop and seek professional help.

Setting Up Your Sterile Workspace

Before you touch anything, thoroughly clean your workspace. Wipe down all surfaces

Step 1: Marking

the Piercing Spot

Using your surgical marker, carefully dot the spot on your nostril where you want the piercing to sit. A traditional nostril piercing is typically placed in the crease of the nostril wing, about halfway between the bottom of your nose and the point where the nostril meets your cheek. Look straight into the mirror and make sure the mark is in a position that you find aesthetically pleasing. Step back and check the placement from different angles. A common mistake is placing the dot too high or too low. Once

you are satisfied, double-check that the mark is precisely on the outside of your nostril and that you can comfortably access the inside of the same spot with the cork.

Step 2: Disinfecti ng the Area

Using a sterile cotton ball soaked in antiseptic solution, thoroughly clean both the inside and outside of your nostril. Apply the antiseptic to the marked area and allow it to air dry completely. Do not touch the area with your ungloved hands. This step is crucial for reducing the bacterial load on the

skin and preventing infection.

Insert the cork or folded piece of sterile gauze firmly into your nostril, positioning it directly behind the spot you have marked. This will serve as a backstop for the needle, preventing it from hitting the inside of your nose and providing a firm surface to push against. The cork should be held in place with your non-dominant hand.

Motion

Take a deep breath and exhale slowly. With your dominant hand, hold the sterile needle at a 90-degree angle to your nostril. With one smooth, steady, and firm motion, push the needle through the tissue. You should feel a brief, sharp sting, and the needle will exit through the inside of your nostril where the cork is positioned. The needle should go through in a single, clean pass. Do not wiggle or hesitate, as this can cause unnecessary trauma

and tearing. The cork will catch the needle tip.

Step 5: Inserting the Jewelry

Once the needle is through, carefully remove the cork while holding the needle steady. Now, take your pre-sterilized jewelry. If your jewelry is a nostril screw or L-shaped stud, you will need to guide the post into the hollow back of the needle. Once it is seated, gently push the jewelry through the piercing while simultaneously pulling the needle out the inside of your nose. This transfers the

jewelry directly into the fresh piercing without leaving it empty. If you are using a labret stud, you may need to unscrew the top, thread the post through, and then reattach the top from the inside. Once the jewelry is through, secure it according to its design. For a labret, screw the ball on the inside of your nostril.

Step 6: Initial Cleaning and Assessme nt

Carefully clean around the new piercing with a

sterile cotton ball dampened with saline solution. You will likely see some minor bleeding, which is normal. Apply gentle pressure with a sterile gauze pad for a few minutes until the bleeding stops. Examine the piercing in the mirror. It should be straight and centered. If it is not, it should only be adjusted within the first few minutes. Once the jewelry is in place, do not remove it for at least 4-6 weeks, as the hole can close very quickly.

IMMEDIATE AFTERCARE FOR YOUR NEW NOSE PIERCING

Proper aftercare is the single most important factor in determining whether your piercing heals well or becomes infected. The healing

process for a nostril piercing typically takes 2 to 4 months, but it can take up to 6 months or longer for some people.

Daily Cleaning Routine

1. **Wash your hands** with antibacterial soap before touching the piercing.
2. **Use a sterile saline solution** (you can buy this at a pharmacy or make your own by mixing 1/4 teaspoon of non-iodized sea salt with 8 ounces of distilled water). Soak a sterile cotton ball or

gauze in the solution.

3. **Gently apply the soaked cotton ball** to the front and back of the piercing for 5-10 minutes, twice a day. This helps soften and remove any crust that forms.
4. **Rinse the area** with clean, running water after cleaning to remove any salt residue.
5. **Pat dry** with a clean paper towel or disposable tissue. Do not use a cloth towel, as it can harbor bacteria and snag the jewelry.

What to Avoid

- **Do not touch, twist, or play with the jewelry.** This is the most common cause of irritation and infection. The jewelry moves naturally with your skin; you do not need to rotate it.
- **Do not use alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, or harsh soaps** on the piercing. These are too strong and will damage the delicate healing tissue, leading to dryness, cracking, and prolonged

healing.

- **Do not swim** in pools, hot tubs, lakes, or oceans for at least the first month. These bodies of water contain bacteria that can cause serious infections.
- **Avoid makeup, lotions, and facial creams** near the piercing site. These products can clog the wound and introduce irritants.
- **Be careful with clothing and towels.** Snagging the jewelry on a sweater or towel can be very painful and can damage the piercing.
- **Sleep on your back** or on the

opposite side to avoid putting pressure on the new piercing.

COMMON PROBLEMS AND HOW TO HANDLE THEM

Even with the best care, complications can arise. It is important to recognize the signs of a problem early so you can take appropriate action.

Infection

Signs of infection include increased redness, swelling, warmth, pain, and the presence of yellow or green pus. If you suspect an infection, do not remove the jewelry, as this can trap the infection inside. Continue cleaning with saline

solution and consult a healthcare professional immediately. You may require oral antibiotics.

Keloids and Hypertrophic Scarring

Some people are prone to developing keloids, which are raised, overgrown scars at the piercing site. Keloids are more common in people with darker skin tones. Hypertrophic scars are similar but usually smaller and may resolve on their own. To minimize scarring, avoid trauma to the area, keep the piercing clean, and consider using silicone

gel sheets or scar treatment products after the piercing is fully healed. If a keloid forms, a dermatologist may need to treat it.

Jewelry Rejection or Migration

In some cases, the body may try to push the jewelry out, known as rejection. This is more common with surface piercings. Signs include the jewelry appearing closer to the surface, thinning of the skin over the jewelry, or the piercing hole growing larger. If you notice this, remove the jewelry immediately to minimize scarring.

WHEN TO SEEK PROFESSIONAL MEDICAL HELP

- Signs of a severe infection, such as fever, chills, or red streaks radiating from the piercing.
