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### HOW TO CREATE YOUR OWN PRESCHOOL CURRICULUM PACING GUIDE

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Building a pacing guide from scratch may seem daunting, but by following a step-by-step process, you can create a custom plan that fits your unique classroom, philosophy, and student

population. Here is a practical approach to get you started.

## Step 1: Gather Your Resources and Standards

Begin by collecting all the foundational documents you will need. For each thematic unit, identify the specific skills you will target in each developmental domain. For a unit on "Transportation," your literacy goals might include learning the letter "T" and reading books about trains and planes.

Your math goals could involve sorting vehicles by size or counting wheels. Your social-emotional goal might be about taking turns with a toy car. By planning this way, you ensure that every theme is rich with cross-curricular learning and that no domain is neglected.

## Step 4: Create a Realistic Timeline

Assign each theme a realistic time frame. A good rule of thumb for preschoolers is one to three weeks per theme. Reserve some weeks for review, assessment, and student-led projects.

Consider the energy levels of the year: the beginning is for building routines, the middle is for deep learning, and the end is for consolidation and celebration. Be sure to leave buffer weeks. If a unit takes longer than expected, you have breathing room without throwing off the entire year.

## Step 5: Plan for Assessment and Documentation

Embed simple assessment strategies into your guide. For each unit, jot down one or two key observations you want to make. For example, during a "Shapes"

unit, you might want to note which children can independently identify a circle, square, and triangle. Schedule portfolio updates and parent communication points. This keeps assessment manageable and integrated, rather than a stressful, last-minute activity.

It is far better to teach ten concepts well than thirty concepts superficially.

**Challenge: Unexpected events**

**disrupt your plan.** Snow days, illness, fire drills, and special assemblies are part of preschool life. Do not panic. Your pacing guide should be seen as a flexible framework. When you lose a day, simply adjust. Prioritize the most essential activities for that unit and let less critical ones go. Remember that the most important "curriculum" is the social-emotional well-being of your students. If they need a day to reconnect after a long break, that is time well spent.

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## A SAMPLE FRAMEWORK FOR YOUR PACING GUIDE

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To help you visualize how a pacing guide comes together, here is a simplified sample framework for the first few months of a preschool year. Remember, this is just a starting point, and your

### **September (Weeks 1-4): Welcome to School / All About Me**

- **Social-Emotional:** Sharing, taking turns, using words to express feelings.
- **Fine Motor:** Holding crayons, simple puzzles, playdough exploration.
